Safe communities are the result of shared responsibility and vision. The Phoenix Police Department prides itself on strengthening partnerships with neighborhoods and public/private organizations to ensure the implementation of policing strategies. Keying on the persons, places, and behaviors as a team will reduce crime and make our community safer.

PERSONS

"Key on Three" begins with focusing on those criminals who can destroy a neighborhood. Focusing on arresting drug dealers, gang members, burglars, robbers and repeat offenders increases the safety and security of our community. Valuable information from the public can help police identify criminals who prey upon our community.

Identifying places where crime frequently occurs or "High Priority Offense Locations" (HPOL) is critical to identifying where police resources need to be deployed. This gives officers direction as they develop plans for "High Priority Enforcement Locations" (HPEL). Real time data-driven intelligence allows the police to focus on criminal activity.

BEHAVIORS

Criminal behaviors such as illegal drug use, neighborhood blight, graffiti and auto theft often lead to more violent crimes such as burglary, robbery and homicides. The philosophy and goal of the Police Department is to inform and educate the community on how to work side-by-side with law enforcement and city service coordination teams to improve our community. Stopping crime begins with correcting behaviors that lead to more severe crimes.
